Part II: Goodridge/Goodrich Ancestry of John-9 Pearl Goodrich and William-1 Goodridge ~ Editor

The editor recently had an unusual, recurring experience that led to a search for a Goodrich descendant, Dr. John Pearl Goodrich, MD (b. 1894), a medical doctor at St. Andrews Hospital in Boothbay Harbor, Maine who married twice but had no known children, and so no descendants.¹ Research revealed that Dr. John Pearl Goodrich descends from immigrant William⁻¹ Goodridge of Watertown, Massachusetts. His Goodridge ancestry became Goodrich when it moved from Newbury, Essex, Massachusetts to Enfield, Grafton, New Hampshire between 1790 and 1800, and then it moved to Orange County, Vermont where he was born and resided before 1920.¹

Research of Dr. John Pearl Goodrich published in this issue provided an opportunity to utilize *The Goodridge Genealogy* (1918),² for an ancestry with 1 generation born in New Hampshire and 3 generations born in Vermont; usually a daunting genealogical tracking scenario. Though *The Goodridge Genealogy* is criticized for inaccuracies in the English history for the immigrant William⁻¹ Goodridge/Goodrich of Watertown, including a mistaken emphasis on the Goodridge surname,³ its information for his line was consistently ~80% accurate (Figure 17; page 41).

Ancestral Generations 1-4 of John⁻⁹ Pearl Goodrich in *The Goodridge Genealogy* ~*Editor*

JEREMIAH⁻⁴, JEREMIAH⁻³, JEREMIAH⁻², WILLIAM⁻¹ GOODRIDGE (The Goodridge Genealogy)⁴

15. **JEREMIAH** GOODRIDGE (Jeremiah Jeremiah William) was born in Newbury, Mass., December 26, 1708. After his marriage, he purchased a home of Samuel Lowell on the Bradford road, where he and his wife spent their lives. He married **ABIGAIL LOWELL**, born in Newbury January 2, 1715, daughter of Joseph and Mary (Hardy) Lowell; intention November 3, 1738 and married January 18, 1739. Benjamin Lowell, a brother of Abigail, possessed a considerable fortune and died unmarried and intestate. His property was divided equally among six heirs, of whom Abigail was one.

Children, all born in Newbury:

- 31. i. Joseph⁻⁵, b. Dec. 7, 1739.
 - ii. William⁻⁵, b. Oct. 22, 1741; d. in infancy.
- 32. iii. Ezekiel⁻⁵, b. Sept. 13, 1744.

- 3. **JEREMIAH² GOODRIDGE** (William⁻¹) was born in Watertown, Mass., March 6, 1638. He settled in Newbury, Mass. where he died January 20, 1707. Isaac Whittier was a substitute for Jeremiah Goodridge at "Cape Breton and Eastward." In his will, proved in Salem, Mass., March 9, 1682, Robert Adams gave to his daughter Mary (Adams) Goodridge one cow. He married in Newbury November 15, 1660 **MARY ADAMS**, born in Newbury, September 1, 1642, daughter of Robert and Eleanor (Wilmot) Adams. There is no record of her death.

1. WILLIAM¹ GOODRIDGE, whose English origin has been reviewed on preceding pages, came from Bury St. Edmunds, County Suffolk, England, where he was probably born May 18, 1605...

(The following is inserted from p 64, with SG [edits]): It has been suggested with some apparent plausibility that William Gooderic[h], the second son of William Gooderic[h] of Hegessette, just mentioned, may have been the William Goodridge of Watertown. This is not inherently impossible, though in the absence of documentary proof the supposition must remain no more than supposition. But certain it is that if William Goodridge and William Gooderic[h] should be thus identified, the John Guttridge who was in Watertown in 1636 could not have been his brother, since John Gooderic[h] of Hegessette was never in this country...

...He was settled in Watertown, Mass., with his wife Margaret and their infant daughter Mary in 1636. In Bury St. Edmunds, as well as can now be ascertained, he was known under the name of Gutridge. In Watertown his name was generally spelled Gutteridge, and in the generations of his descendants immediately following, in Newbury, it became Goodridge, a form that, with few exceptions, has since been followed.

At once, upon his arrival in this country, he became a leading man in the infant community and a considerable owner of property. At the time of his death he owned forty-three acres of land with buildings and personal property. He was admitted to be a freeman May 18, 1642. This right of freeman embraced the obligation of church membership, the privilege of franchise and a share in divisions of unoccupied land and other property thus far held in common.

He was a man of much dignity, winning presence and gentlemanly bearing, and distinguished by kindliness in private life; a real leader, whose strong character and optimistic outlook were an uplift in those days of struggle, sacrifice and depression. This leadership was always in sympathy and support among those whose travail had been most severe. Gathering up and interpreting what has been said, it seems reasonably certain that his attitude toward life was a strong sense of leadership, dominated by a desire of helpfulness, neighborly sympathy and feeling of brotherhood. In short, he had all the attributes of a cultivated gentleman with noteworthy lineage and a look outward and upward rather than inward...

... He died, in Watertown; March 21, 1647, and was buried in the cemetery near the homestall where he had spent the whole of his colonial life; but the exact location of his grave was long ago hopelessly forgotten. On April 3, 1647, Margaret Goodridge, widow, returned an inventory of the estate of her deceased husband, to the court in Boston...

...He married, in England, about 1632, MARGARET, whose maiden name is not known, and she, with four children, survived him.

In 1650 the widow Margaret Goodridge married John Hull, of Newbury, Mass., and thereafter resided in that town, where she concentrated her interests, selling her holdings in Watertown...

John Hull died in Newbury, Mass., February 1, 1670, and Margaret survived him until February 3, 1682. She divided her property equally among her four children, Mary, Jeremiah, Joseph and Benjamin. She had no children by her second husband.

Corroboration of Goodridge/Goodrich Ancestry of John-9 Pearl Goodrich





Figure 1. Birth of Jeremiah⁻⁴ Goodridge in Newbury, Essex, Massachusetts (*last visible entry*). 12

JEREMIAH GOODRIDGE: b. 26 Dec 1708 (Newbury, MA); s/o Jeremiah Goodridge and Mary Rowe (Figure 1); m. 18 Jan 1738/9 (Figure 3) **ABIGAIL LOWELL** b. 02 Jan 1715/6 (Newbury, MA; Figure 2); d/o Joseph and Mary Lowell. Neither death record was found.




Figure 5. Jeremiah⁻³ Goodridge-Mary Roe 11 Dec 1703 intention at Newbury, Essex, Massachusetts. ¹⁶

JEREMIAH⁻³ **GOODRIDGE**: on his published date of birth, 04 Sep 1667,⁴ in the Newbury, Essex, Massachusetts birth records, only the birth of one girl, Ruth Lowle, is recorded (Figure 4), followed by the 13 Sep 1667 birth of first cousin John⁻³ Goodridge, son of Joseph⁻² Goodridge (Figure 4); no birth for Jeremiah⁻³ Goodridge s/o Jeremiah⁻² Goodridge is recorded in Newbury. This was the most recent instance in which an uncorroborated date of birth was attributed to a post-immigrant ancestor of John⁻⁹ Pearl Goodrich in *The Goodridge Genealogy*. The intention of his marriage to *Mary Roe* dated 11 Dec 1703, in which his name is: *Jeremiah Goodridge Jr*, (Figure 5), connects him to his parents, since in Newbury there was one Jeremiah⁻² Goodridge, son of William⁻¹ Goodridge, and connects him to his wife **Mary Rowe**. No birth record for Mary Rowe, or death record for Jeremiah⁻³ Goodridge or his wife Mary, have been found.

JEREMIAH⁻² **GOODRIDGE**: b. 06 Mar 1637/8 (Watertown, MA); s/o William Goodridge and wife Margaret (Figure 6); m. on 15 Nov 1660 (Newbury, MA) **MARY ADAMS** (Figure 7). Though wife Mary Adams has a published date of birth 01 Sep 1642, the record has not been found. Her connection to parents Robert and Eleanor (Wilmot) Adams is revealed in his will.⁴ The published date of death 20 Jan 1706/7 for Jeremiah⁻² Goodridge⁴ has not been corroborated.

WILLIAM GOODRICH III/WILLIAM⁻¹ GOODRIDGE: postulated eldest son of William Goodrich II (bp. 11 Sep 1580; Figure 10) of Hessett and Barbara Cole (m. 16 May 1608; Figure 11). By family tradition: eldest sons Robert (b. 1577) of William Goodrich I (b. ~1545) of Hessett and Robert (b. ~1563) of Adam Goodrich (b. ~1536) of Felsham both had as their namesake grandfather Robert Goodrich (b. ~1505) of Felsham, and eldest son William Goodrich the Elder (b. ~1616) of John Goodrich of Bury St. Edmunds (b. ~1587) had as his namesake grandfather William Goodrich I of Hessett.⁶

So William Goodrich III was named after paternal grandfather William Goodrich I of Hessett. Even if named after his father, the eldest son of William Goodrich II baptized at St. Ethelbert-Hessett 11 Jun 1609 (Figure 11) was William Goodrich III; brother of Robert (bp. 29 Aug 1619; Figure 12); first cousin of Bury St. Edmunds brothers John II (bp. 1618) and William Goodrich the Younger (bp. 1622).⁷

William Goodrich III m. **MARGARET BUTTERFIELD** on 19 Aug 1631 at Woolverstone, Suffolk, England (Figure 13); there were born William IV; baptized 04 Oct 1632 (Figure 14) and buried 30 Apr 1633 (Figure 15), and Mary, baptized 21 Aug 1634 (Figure 14).⁸ They came to America ~1635 and there were born Jeremiah b. 06 Mar 1637/8 (Figure 6), Joseph b. 29 Sep 1639, and Benjamin b. 11 Apr 1643.⁹




Figure 16. Death of twice-widowed Margaret (Butterfield-Goodrich) Hull in Newbury, Essex, MA.²⁴

William⁻¹ Goodridge died before an indenture dated 08 May 1645, executed by Samuel Thatcher and his widow, by which his second son Joseph became an apprentice.¹⁰ The inventory of his estate was dated 03 Apr 1647, after which his widow Margaret married Captain John Hull in 1650, and with him and her sons moved to Newbury, Essex, Massachusetts and lived there until her death on 03 Feb 1682/3 (Figure 16).¹¹

A disproven theory is that John Goodrich, father of immigrants John Goodrich and William Goodrich of Wethersfield, Connecticut, was the eldest son of William Goodrich I of Hessett, so born ~1570-1574. William and Margaret (Richardson) Goodrich could have had daughters baptized at Hessett in 1570-1574 who did not survive until the will of William Goodrich I of Hessett was drafted on 04 Apr 1631, but not sons, since a Hessett feoffment deed dated 06 Oct 1585 named William Goodrich and Robert his son, 21 revealing the eldest son of William Goodrich I of Hessett was then Robert, who was not named in his will. Subsequent baptisms at St. Ethelbert-Hessett also reveal the order of sons of William Goodrich I was: Robert, William, Henry; baptisms of youngest son-principal heir John in ~1587 and daughter Elizabeth were not listed. By tradition, Robert was named after paternal grandfather Robert Goodrich of Felsham.

William⁻¹ Goodridge of Watertown and the Wethersfield Goodrich Brothers in 1635-1636 ~ *Editor*

Published speculations concerning the relationship of William⁻¹ Goodridge of Watertown and John⁻¹ and William⁻¹ Goodrich of Wethersfield began with Bond's footnote conjecture in 1855.²⁶ Clement Chaplin, a Bury St. Edmunds chandler,²⁷ was entrusted by John Goodrich the Clothier of Bury St. Edmunds in his 1632 will as the guardian of his soon-to-be orphaned sons.²⁸





Figure 18. 1635 Cambridge resident map; Clement Chaplin owned 3 houses in Cambridge at the time. 34

This included control of the properties inherited by son/principal heir John II (bp. 1618), and the £300 total, inherited by sons William the Elder (b. ~1616/7),²⁹ William the Younger (bp. 1622) and Jeremiah (bp. 1627),³⁰ until each reached age 21.³³ A further stipulation in the will was that if any son was uncooperative with Margerie, or with any other guardian (*Clement Chaplin alone, since all others named declined*) who took her place in the event of her death (*occurred within a month after John died*), the inheritance of the uncooperative son would be divided among his brothers.³³ So from 1632-1635, Clement Chaplin had full cooperation of the Bury St. Edmunds brothers John Goodrich II and William the Younger Goodrich, and later from 1635-1639 of John⁻¹ Goodrich and from 1635-1643 of William⁻¹ Goodrich of Wethersfield, including when they lived in Cambridge, Massachusetts, east of Watertown, in 1635-1636 (Figures 18, 19).

Clement Chaplin had arrived in Boston in 1635 on the *Elizabeth and Ann*, most likely with wife Sarah (Hinds) Chaplin, the daughter of a Bury St. Edmunds goldsmith,³¹ as an unlisted passenger (*opined James Savage in 1860*).³² Chaplin may have been attended by his wife,³² and even his immigrant charges John and William Goodrich, since children of Rev. Peter Bulkeley traveling under assumed names are said to have been on the same 1635 *Elizabeth and Ann* voyage³² that took Clement Chaplin and companions to Boston. In Cambridge in 1635/6, Rev. Peter Bulkeley owned 5 houses (Figure 20), and Clement Chaplin: 1) owned 3 houses, 2) was 1 of 9 men tasked 23 Nov 1635 with *ordering all business of Cambridge* (Figure 20), and 3) lived ~1.4 miles from William⁻¹ Goodridge, who lived on the north side of Mount Auburn Cemetery (Figure 19).³³

If John Goodrich II and William Goodrich the Younger of Bury St. Edmunds did not accompany Clement Chaplin on the *Elizabeth and Ann*, then another possibility that could have brought them to Boston, and eventually Cambridge in a similar 1635/6 timeframe, would be if they came with the family of William Goodrich III of Woolverstone, and since the voyage that brought the family of William Goodrich III to America in ~1635/6 is not known, there would be no need to unravel assumed names on a passenger manifest. This would also be an alternative means by which Clement Chaplin could be joined in Massachusetts by his wife Sarah.

The records of a Cambridge town meeting dated 08 Feb 1635/6 reveal that Clement Chaplin, who owned 3 houses in Cambridge (Figure 20),⁴⁰ had charge of an additional male, of age and status suitable to take up the task of being a community shepherd (Figure 20; end of page 17):⁴¹

Agreed with Mr. Chaplin that his man shall keep the goats, and to have three half-pence a week for one goat and a penny a week for wethers or kids, to begin next Monday.

Possibly William Goodrich the Younger, then age 14, was apprenticed in animal husbandry this way, and if so he was a likely occupant of one of the houses Clement Chaplin owned. So where was his brother John, who by then was age 18? Or was it John who kept the goats in Cambridge?

Meanwhile, in neighboring Watertown, Massachusetts, 3-acre meadow grants (1 acre per person or per £20-value cattle) were made in 1636-1637 to John Guttereg and William Guttereg. William Goodridge of Watertown had a homestead, 43 a household of 3,44,45 and by 1642 owned 25 acre and 3 acre grants (1636-1637) made initially to John Goodridge, who had no homestead recorded at any time, and disappeared from the Watertown records after 1637. 46

Henry Bond, by 1855, implied that *William Goodridge* and *John Goodridge* were the same man, ⁴⁷ or *John* was John Goodridge of Boston admitted as Massachusetts freeman in 1642. ⁴⁸

Next-generation-sequencing Y-SNP Y-DNA data (2015) involving known Y-descendants of William⁻¹ Goodridge of Watertown, MA (G50), Thomas⁻¹ Goodrich of Old Rappahannock, VA (G62), and William⁻¹ Goodrich of Wethersfield, CT (G18)⁴⁹ connects William⁻¹ Goodridge to John⁻¹ Goodrich and William⁻¹ Goodrich of Wethersfield, who joined Clement Chaplin in Wethersfield in ~1636, soon after Clement Chaplin had been among the group that followed Rev. Thomas Hooker to settle in Hartford, Connecticut.

Cambridge, Massachusetts and Hartford, Connecticut were twin communities named Newtown in the same sense as Watertown and Wethersfield were named Watertown, until all four communities achieved unique identities on 21 February 1636/7.⁵⁰

Though Clement Chaplin of Cambridge was among followers of Rev. Thomas Hooker who arrived in Hartford, Connecticut in 1636, Chaplin settled in Wethersfield as Ruling Elder and largest landowner;⁵¹ there assisted in farm labors by his charges, John and William Goodrich.

This could explain how John disappeared from the records of Watertown in 1637, and the lands once granted to John belonged to William⁻¹ Goodridge of Watertown in the 1642 inventory.⁵²

The 1644 Watertown land inventory still listed pre-1637 Wethersfield settlers Robert Seeley, Thurston Raynor, Andrew Ward and Nathaniel Foote, 53, 54 though 1644 was actually three years after Andrew Ward and Thurston Raynor had been among those who left Wethersfield to follow Rev. Richard Denton to Stamford, Fairfield, Connecticut in 1641. 55




Figure 21. English pedigree of William Goodrich III, who became William Goodridge in America. 56

Goodrich Surname DNA Project: December 2018 Update

The Goodrich Surname DNA Project roster now includes: 78 Y-STR Y-DNA kits (including 42 kits in the Felsham Goodrich haplogroup E-V13), 42 mtDNA kits, 71 Family Finder kits, 4 Y-Elite + 4 Big Y NGS-SNP kits completed and 5 Y-Elite NGS-SNP kits in progress, and 4 YSEQ Felsham Goodrich panel single Y-SNP tests.

Some recent developments since the April, 2018 update include the following:

EU General Data Protection Regulation (GDPR) Privacy Rules Implemented 25 May 2018

The EU General Data Protection Regulations were approved 27 Apr 2016 and went into effect on 25 May 2018. As a result of these regulations, the World Families Network, YSearch and MitoSearch websites were discontinued. In some cases, proactive removal of personal information on websites, or discontinuation of doing business in affected areas in the EU, were begun at this time, even if the new EU privacy regulations did not actually require the changes.

A message board post by Roberta Estes on her blog DNAExplained–Genetic Genealogy, and its recommendations, was uploaded on 14 May 2018 and explains in greater detail:⁵⁷

World Families Network, Ysearch and Mitosearch Bite the Dust – Thanks So Much GDPR Posted on May 14, 2018

It's a sad month.

The core foundation of genetic genealogy is sharing.

GDPR is NOT about sharing easily, and the GDPR hoops are onerous, to be charitable. I wrote about GDPR in the articles GDPR – It's a Train and It's a Comin' and Common Sense and GDPR.

One might say GDPR is at cross purposes with genealogy. It probably wasn't intended that way, but so far, we've lost several resources due to GDPR, and it's still not here yet.

Add to the death list World Families Network, Ysearch and Mitosearch.

The cost of GDPR compliance, necessary attorney fees along with the risk of the horrific fines of up to 4 million Euro is just too much for a small business or a non-profit. Additionally, non-EU businesses are <u>required</u> to retain a European Representative company that agrees to absorb some level of the risk for non-compliance. Try finding a company to do that. Not to mention the pain-in-the-butt-factor of the hoops that they would have to jump through if so much as one person complained. Bottom line – not worth it.



The projects hosted at World Families Network (WFN) will revert to their project pages at Family Tree DNA, so all is not lost, BUT, the information on the Patriarch's pages as well as some of the information on the actual DNA results pages at WFN does not come directly from Family Tree DNA. Some WFN sites are not fed from the Family Tree DNA project pages at all, so fields like "Earliest Ancestor" at WFN may be blank at Family Tree DNA. That, of course, can be remedied, but won't happen automatically.

Many of the projects managed by WFN were abandoned, meaning they have no administrator. Some have administrators that preferred the WFN format to the Family Tree DNA format. One of the most popular features was the Patriarchs page where lineages of men with the project surname were listed. This feature was put in place before trees were available at Family Tree DNA – but the Patriarchs format serves as a one-glance resource and can be connected to the kit numbers on the DNA pages.

Please, please, please do two things:


• Visit the WFN surname links here for projects and scan the projects shown with "project site," meaning they are WFN hosted, to see if any include your ancestral surnames. If SO, visit that WFN project site by clicking the link and record any information relevant to your family.



Consider adopting projects relevant to your surname. Most of these projects will need to be spruced up at Family Tree DNA, meaning they will need to be grouped and the Patriarch's page will need to be copied onto one of the several available project pages at Family Tree DNA. Many of these projects are small and you can easily preserve information. Terry provides a list of orphaned projects here, but I don't know if it's current. I would reach out to Family Tree DNA at groups@familytreedna.com about any project listed as having a project site at WFN. Some projects have an administrator listed, but they are no longer active. For project administrators considering a private website, be aware per the GDPR requirements that you will constantly have to monitor the privacy settings at Family Tree DNA and assure that you are not displaying information for anyone who has selected, or changed their project setting from public to "project only." Family Tree DNA automatically removes the project members data from a public display when they change settings or leave projects.


Ysearch and Mitosearch

On May 10th, on their Forum, a Family Tree DNA representative announced that Ysearch and Mitosearch will be shut down by month end. These databases were established in 2003 by Family Tree DNA for free, open sharing.



While this announcement doesn't state that it's because of GDPR, that correlation probably isn't coincidence. These two data bases have been on life support for some time now. They have been less immediately useful since other testing companies stopped Y and mitochondrial DNA testing, meaning that you could see all of your new matches at Family Tree DNA.

One of their biggest benefits, even for Family Tree DNA customers, was that these were the two databases where everyone could compare actual marker values, not just see if they matched and genetic distance.



Unfortunately, Ysearch and Mitosearch were the only locations left for people who uploaded from those now-defunct databases. Of the 219,410 records in the Ysearch database, 25,521 are from sources other than Family Tree DNA.

Originally, there were four public databases. The other two have been gone for some time, with these being the last two resources to go. This is truly a tragedy for the genetic genealogy community, because unlike the WFN departure where the projects are still available at Family Tree DNA – there is no alternative resource to Ysearch and Mitosearch. Gone is gone – especially for the 25,000+ results archived there from companies that are also gone meaning Relative Genetics, Oxford Ancestors, Ancestry's now defunct Y DNA, Sorenson and others.

Recently, Family Tree DNA fixed the captcha issue, but the sites are still not fully functional. I tried to retrieve information by searching by surname at Ysearch, and the search failed with an error. I don't know if the problem now is the actual data base or the fact that the site is overwhelmed by people trying to do exactly what I was trying to do.

As someone in the Family Tree DNA forum thread said: GDPR: The gift from Europe that just keeps on giving.

As sad as I am to see both of these resources go, I want to publicly thank Terry and Marilyn Barton for their 14 years of service to the genetic genealogy community and wish them well in their retirement. Hopefully they will have time to solve their own genealogy mysteries now.

I also want to thank Family Tree DNA for establishing both Ysearch and Mitosearch, and maintaining these sites as long as they have. Few companies would have established a platform for their customers to compare results with their competitors' products which speaks to their early and ongoing commitment to genealogy.

I still have a copy of the Patriarch Page for the Y-descendants of Ensign William-1 Goodrich that was prepared and uploaded in October, 2010 if anyone needs to access information in it.




Figure 22. Latest NGS Y-SNP Testing Results.

<u>Next-Generation-Sequencing Y-SNP Testing Latest Findings: New Ancestral Placements</u> As shown in Figure 22:

- G96 (surname Winters) and G94 (Goodrich) co-descend from Richard-3, Ephraim-2 Goodrich.
 - o Probably through Zacheus-4 Goodrich of Sheffield, Berkshire, Massachusetts.
 - The earliest-known Y-ancestor of G94 was born in Sheffield.
 - o G96 and G94 share the 3 Y-SNP mutations E-FGC61650, E-FGC61651, E-FGC61652.
 - o G96 has an additional unique Y-SNP mutation, E-F4092, not shared with G94.
 - o The generation-5 ancestor of G94 is still to be determined.
- G77 (surname Griswold) and G6 (surname Goodrich) co-descend from David-2 Goodrich.
 - o They share Y-SNP mutation E-A21920; the study of their detailed co-descent is ongoing.
 - It is uncertain, at this point, if G77 and G6 are also co-descendants of David-3 Goodrich.
 - G8, another co-descendant of David-2 Goodrich, is taking the Y-Elite 2.1 test to assist.
- G53 (surname Goodrich) may co-descend from Gideon-3 Goodrich with G101.
 - o G53 and G101 are both taking the Y-Elite 2.1 test to explore this possibility.
 - o If G53 and G101 do not share any SNPs beyond the 4 shared by all Y-descendants of Ensign William-1 Goodrich who have tested so far, G53 may share SNPs with other kits that have tested so far and this may reveal the actual Y-ancestry of G53.
- G17 is taking the Y-Elite 2.1 test and eventually may be able to match Y-SNP mutations with another Y-descendant of Allen-3 Goodrich.
