The Goodrich Surname DNA Project has experienced a very busy Quarter; at one point we were awaiting 24 different test results of all kinds – yDNA, mtDNA, Family Finder, Comprehensive Genome, and others.

In addition, we have added new members. Membership in the DNA project now totals 67. Family Tree DNA has recently adopted consumer-friendly changes, in that they are now offering special discounts more often, they are working to shorten the turnaround time for test results from 8-10 weeks to 5-6 weeks, and have lowered the regular price of the basic 12-marker yDNA to \$49.00 going forward, after having a \$39.00 sale for that test for a while that some GFA members took advantage of.

For those of you who watch for the special sales, FTDNA has started holding smaller sales and more often, but for shorter periods of time. I don't receive enough advance notice of coming sales to keep everyone properly updated through the Quarterly. What you can do is one of two things - check the test price list regularly on our Surname Project site, or you can send me an email and I will keep a listing of folks to inform of sales as I receive the information. The next sale will be a Father's Day sale of yDNA upgrades – but I don't yet have the specifics. The special prices will be on our DNA web site on Father's Day under the order tab at the top. Note: orders must be made from our GFA DNA site in order to receive the sales prices. Check the "sales" tab on our Goodrich project site to see what the current prices of tests are:

More changes have been made to members' personal page sites for easier access to their information; the different information lists have been made into individual blocks. In addition, FTDNA will soon be changing the haplo identifications, for example they will soon change the longhand (J-L147) in view of instead the shorthand (J11c3d). After the changes are made we plan to redo the yDNA results chart to show this new information. The chart is available to view on the DNA site by clicking the yDNA Results tab.

Mary E. Goodrich Hair Book

The term “Hair Book” or “Friendship Book.”

Hair books became popular in America around 1836-1870s. A friendship book such as the one listed below is a compilation of our ancestors’ locks of hair, along with members of our extended family and personal friends. During the early 1800s individuals were putting family locks of hair in picture frames to hang on the wall, in jewelry and in other decorative art. For more history on hair books, I recommend reading Family Tree Maker’s article, “Hair Heirlooms,” by Maureen A. Taylor, 25 Sept 2009 (now online).

This hair book not only has pieces of a life event of individuals, but it also allows our personal eyes to behold the hair so precious to see and touch. I can remember holding this precious gem before I even knew the significance of what I was holding. The special memories I have of family members gathered around a kitchen table, and listening to my older relatives express their feelings and memories of people long since gone, are priceless. We all gazed with amazement upon this little book, which was only about four inches wide and six inches long.

My second g-grandmother Mary E. Goodrich has a lock of her mother’s hair contained within. Her mother, Elizabeth Palmiter, born 21 April 1789 Suffield, CT, was married to Dr. Charles Goodrich born 21 Nov 178?. In 2047, this book will be 200 years old. James Edward McKee, being the youngest son of Mary E. (Goodrich) McKee, inherited this family treasure. My grandmother, being the oldest daughter of James E. McKee, inherited this book and then my mother. Today the hair book is in the possession of my older sister. My sister so graciously not only scanned the book but also gave me a listing of all the colors of hair for future posterity.

The Hair Book is well worn with age, and has traces of locks of hair here and there; some pages have missing information and locks of hair that were at one time on the pages. The ink was a brownish color and faded in part. It is a great treasure of genealogy information. The book hints of migration patterns as relatives leave one area and move to another. Of other genealogical value which bless this little book, are individuals' handwriting and signatures. The hair book documents positive relationships by writing cousins, mother, etc.

Some of the hair inside this little book was embroidered, some braided and others just loops and weaving. The locks of hair were pasted within the book with pieces of tough decorative paper much like the old black corners with glue attached for the placement of pictures in old picture albums. Many pages of this book contained information on both sides of the pages, but time can be very cruel even in vaults and archival protection.

I have traced most of the families recorded in this book. To my delight I was able to find marriages, land records, military records, obituaries, probate, and migration patterns. This led to other people who were also searching for their families.

I contacted a Palmiter cousin and found my first break in my Goodrich and Palmiter lineages going back to the 1700s. Some of her relatives have hair locks inside this little book. This led to the discovery of a 2nd marriage we were all unaware of. All I had was information my g-aunt wrote on a piece of paper for me about the birth and death of Charles Goodrich and family. A member of the Nickerson Family Association shared that Elizabeth Goodrich married as her 2nd husband Col. Hugh Nickerson. Thus, the journey began to find our Charles Goodrich.

Sixteen pages remain in this "little book" in which my 2nd g-grandmother wrote the following on page 1:

Elizur Goodrich, (LWC468) b. 09 Aug 1779,⁶ d. Apr 1850^{3,11} m1. Lydia Egbertson,¹³ she d. 03 Aug 1823,¹³ m.2 Lucy (Smith) Fish ca. 1824, Pontiac, Oakland, MI. Elizur was wounded 05 July 1814³ in the Battle of Chippewa, War of 1812.⁴ Bereaved by the death of Lydia in 1822, Elizur sailed on the schooner Hannah from Buffalo to Detroit with six of his sons, while the seventh son drove overland through Canada. Elizur and his sons settled in Oakland County, Michigan, where he married widow Lucy Smith Fish and they had two more sons and a daughter.¹⁰

Elizur Goodrich and first wife Lydia Egbertson had eight sons:

After holding office in Lansing, Alanson and his wife moved to DeWitt where he and son George farmed and Alanson and his wife donated land for the first schoolhouse, which opened on their homestead in 1836.⁴

How Do You Spell Roland?

Since there are so many Goodriches in America, the first and middle names are repeated quite often in ancestral and descendant families. Roland was a name which was different from the frequently found names of George, John, William, Ann, Mary and Sarah.

I came across the name Roland while looking for Goodriches buried in Fort Snelling National Cemetery, Minneapolis, Hennepin County, Minnesota. I found Roland Franklin Goodrich (1908-1985) and Roland Wallace Goodrich (1934-1995). An obituary for Roland F. Goodrich stated that Roland F. of S. Mpls. was a lifetime member of Disabled American Veterans, survived by wife Isabel, son Roland W., two daughters, and sisters, Nadine Maxfield and Helen Bourgeois. This established the relationship between Roland Franklin Goodrich and Roland Wallace Goodrich.

I traced Roland Franklin, who was born in Iowa, to Frederick Rolland Goodrich (b. 1885 in Iowa) in Ancestry.com. He was born to Roland Evans Goodrich (1844-1914,) who was born in Ohio.

Since Roland was an unusual name for the Goodriches, I took a chance and looked for Roland Evans in The Goodrich Family in America book by Lafayette Wallace Case, 1889. Bingo! Roland was listed in the index on two different pages. I found Roland E. Goodrich (#2048) on page 270 in the Case book and was able to connect him to his father, Walter C. Goodrich (#1016, Ezekiel #355, Solomon #122, Richard #44 Ephraim #16, William "The Ensign" #2).

Walter C. was born August 4, 1808 in Ohio and married Minerva Beach on March 9, 1830. She was born in 1808 in Fairfield County, Connecticut to Benjamin and Anna *Hawley* Beach and died July 20, 1866 in Iowa. Minerva was buried in Otho Cemetery, Otho, Webster County, Iowa per the Find A Grave web site. Walter and Minerva went from Ohio to Iowa between 1844 and 1848 based on the birth year and location of their last two children. The children of Walter and Minerva were as follows:

- Curtis Augustus Goodrich born June 7, 1831 in Ohio; died July 20, 1911; buried in St. Johns Cemetery, Pensacola, Florida
- George Asbury Goodrich born October 1, 1833 in Franklin County, Ohio; died July 1, 1903 in Ohio;
- Benjamin Beach Goodrich born May 26, 1836 in Ohio; died 1910 in Kansas
- Ezekiel Lewis Goodrich born January 18, 1839 in Ohio; died May 22, 1922 in Missouri; buried in Dealia, Pettis County, Missouri
- Elbridge Gerry Goodrich born April 17, 1842 in Ohio; died February 24, 1906 in Iowa; buried in West Lawn Cemetery, Lehigh, Webster County, Iowa; married Mary Ann Lewis (March 1, 1846 in England -August 14, 1935); buried in West Lawn Cemetery, Lehigh, Webster County, Iowa;
As can be seen on page 269 in the Case book, Elbridge had a son Benjamin Rolland born February 19, 1871 in Iowa; died 1927 in Iowa; buried in Pilot Mound Cemetery, Pilot Mound, Boone County, Iowa. His wife, Mary V. Parks Goodrich (1881-1945), was buried there too.
- Roland Evans Goodrich born September 8, 1844 in Ohio; died 1914; buried in Otho Cemetery, Otho, Webster County, Iowa
- Walter Clark Goodrich born April 2, 1848 in Iowa; died July 26, 1934 in Washington

More information on the above children and most of their descendants can be found in the Case book on pages 268-270.

George Asbury Goodrich, second son of Walter C. and Minerva, was born October 1, 1833 in Franklin County, Ohio. He married Emily Caroline Smith who was born on January 7, 1836 in New Albany, Franklin County, Ohio. Emily was the daughter of Henry and Anne Smith. George and Emily were found in the July 16, 1860 US Census for Brooklyn, Lee County, Illinois but they moved back to Ohio. They are in the August 2, 1870 US Census for Harlem, Delaware County, Ohio.

George and Emily had three children: son Goodrich, Jethro Gideon Goodrich (1861-1908) born and died in Ohio. He was married to Alta E Smothers (1867-1941). Both are buried in Galena

Cemetery, Galena, Delaware County, Ohio. Dora Goodrich (1865-1943) married Frank Delano Bennett (1864-1955) and both are also buried in the Galena Cemetery per the Find A Grave web site.

George Asbury Goodrich's obituary was found in the Find A Grave website:

George Asbury Goodrich, was born Oct. 1, 1833 in Franklin Co. and died in Galena, O., July 1, 1903, aged 69 years and 9 months. He was married to Emily Smith Oct., 21, 1855. Three children were born to them one passing away in infancy while the mother and two children, several grandchildren and many friends remained to mourn their loss.

He became a member of the church early in life, and was an active worker for many years, especially in Sunday School.

He was a local preacher for a number of years. Mr. Goodrich was a very kind neighbor and will be very much missed in this community.

The funeral services were conducted at the home of Rev. E. S. Tompkins, Thursday, July 2 at 2:30 p.m. and largely attended by neighbors and old friends.

Emily Caroline Smith Goodrich's obituary was found in Find a Grave website also:

Emily Caroline Smith, daughter of Henry and Anna Smith, was born near New Albany, Franklin Co., O., Jan. 17, 1836 and departed this life Nov. 29, 1913 at the age of 77 years, 10 mos., 12 days. She was of a family of seven children, all of whom have preceded her to the Better World. She was united in marriage to George A Goodrich, Oct. 21, 1855, who died July 1, 1903. To this union was born three children, two sons, one dying in infancy, the other five years ago, and a daughter, Mrs. F.D. Bennett, at whose house she was at the time of her death.

Besides her daughter she leaves to mourn her death, seven grandchildren, one great-grandchild and a host of other relatives and friends. She united with the M.E. church at the age of 12 years. She was always a kind and loving mother and grandmother, a good neighbor and will be greatly missed by those who knew her.

The funeral services were held Dec. 1, 1913 at the home of her daughter, Mrs. F.D. Bennett, conducted by Rev. Ackman, and her remains were laid to rest in the Galena Cemetery.

Roland Evans Goodrich

Since this article is about the spelling of Roland, variations were found in the census records.

The June 19, 1860 US Census for Sumner, Webster County, Iowa showed Rollin (Roland Evans) Goodrich, age 16 born in Ohio. In the July 15, 1870 US Census for the same location, he was Rowland, age 26, born in Ohio and he was a farmhand. The June 16, 1880 US Census for the same location showed Goodrich, Rorolin, age 35 born in Ohio, a farmer. His wife was Ida, age 36 born in Polk County, Iowa.

The 1895 Iowa State Census for Burnside, Webster County, Iowa showed Goodrich, Roland E., age 35, born in Ohio, a farmer. Since the age, place of birth and occupation matched with previous census records, he had to be the same person. The June 1, 1900 US Census for Webster, Webster County, Iowa had Goodrich, Rollin E., born September 1844 in Ohio and married 21

years, a farmer. The May 12, 1910 US Census for Sumner, Webster County, Iowa had Goodrich, Roland E., age 65 born in Ohio, married once for 31 years, a farmer.

Roland Evans' wife, Ida F. Divilbliss, was born in December of 1859 in Polk County, Iowa. The Iowa Marriages, 1851-1900 has a marriage date of January 17, 1879 for Roland and Ida whereas the Case book has a marriage date of January 26, 1879. She died in 1930 in Webster County, Iowa and was buried in the Otho Cemetery, Otho, Webster County, Iowa.

Roland and Ida had the following children:

- Harry Lee Goodrich, born December 5, 1879 in Iowa; died 1897 in Iowa; buried in Otho Cemetery, Otho, Webster County, Iowa

Frederick Rolland Goodrich

Frederick Rolland Goodrich, son of Roland E. Goodrich and Ida Divilbliss, was born October 10, 1885 in Lehigh, Webster County, Iowa. His spouse was Carrie Mildred *Hyde* Goodrich. She was born October 1, 1882 in Leland, LaSalle County, Illinois. Frederick and Carrie were married on August 18, 1907 in Fort Dodge, Webster County, Iowa. She died October 11, 1954 in Fort Dodge, Webster County, Iowa. They had the following children:

- Roland Franklin Goodrich, born July 3, 1908, Iowa; d. April 28, 1985, Minneapolis, Hennepin County, Minnesota

Frederick Rolland Goodrich was in the 1910 US Census for Ward 3, Fort Dodge, Webster County, Iowa as Goodrich, Fred R., age 25 born in Iowa, a carpenter with Goodrich, Carrie, age 27, born in Illinois and Goodrich, Roland Franklin, age 9 months, born in Minnesota. Frederick was in the January 9, 1920 US Census for Ward 2, Fort Dodge, Webster County, Iowa as follows:

- Goodrich, Carrie, 37 born in IL
- Goodrich, Roland, 11 born in IA
- Goodrich, Donald, 8 born in IA

The Iowa Birth and Christening Index 1857-1947 gave Frederick's name as Frederick Rolland Goodrich. The California Death Index, 1940-1997 has Frederick Roland Goodrich. He died September 13, 1957 in San Bernardino, San Bernardino County, California.

Roland Franklin Goodrich

Roland Franklin Goodrich married Lydia Emily Huckel. She was born in 1912 and died July 30, 1944. Roland Franklin then married Isabel Mathilda with unknown last name. She was born November 11, 1902 and died October 20, 2000. All three were buried in the Fort Snelling National Cemetery, Minneapolis, Hennepin County, Minnesota. Roland was a PR 3 in the US Navy during World War II. Roland and Lydia had the following children:

- Roland Wallace Goodrich born June 8, 1934; died June 25, 1995 in Minnesota; buried in Fort Snelling National Cemetery. He married Irene, born December 18, 1926; died February 17, 2009 in Minnesota; buried in Fort Snelling National Cemetery.

The Roland in the 1920 US Census was Roland Franklin Goodrich born July 3, 1908 in Iowa. He died April 28, 1985 in Minneapolis, Hennepin County, Minnesota per 1985-MN-010015 Death Index. Roland Franklin's son, Roland Wallace, was born June 8, 1934 and died June 25, 1995 in Hennepin County per 1995-MN-015623 Death Index. Roland Wallace was a MSG in the Army during the Korean and Viet Nam Wars.

Ida Mae Goodrich, youngest child of Roland Evans and Ida F. Goodrich, was born May 1, 1899 in Lehigh, Webster County, Iowa and she died May 9, 1992. Ida married Orville Roland Julian who was born December 15, 1899 in Kumar County, Iowa. He died in July of 1978 in Bailey, Muskegon County, Michigan. Ida was buried in the Otho Cemetery, Otho, Webster County, Iowa.

Walter Clark Goodrich, youngest child of Walter C. Goodrich and Minerva Beach Goodrich was born April 2, 1848 in Lehigh, Webster County, Iowa. He married Arminda who was born about 1865 in Missouri. He then married Margaret Armenia Ewing on March 6, 1873 in Webster County, Iowa. She was born March 6, 1852 in Pennsylvania and died September 2, 1909 in Washington. Walter Clark and Margaret had the following children:

- Nellie R. Goodrich born July 25, 1874 in Iowa
- Jennie Irene Goodrich born July 13, 1876 in Iowa
- Foster Elbridge Goodrich born January 11, 1880 in Iowa; died May 11, 1936 in Washington; married June Edna Hill about 1908 in Lehigh, Webster County, Iowa. Foster was buried in Colfax Cemetery, Colfax, Whitman County, Washington
- James B. Goodrich born August 7, 1886 in Iowa; died August 3, 1887 in Iowa; buried in Otho cemetery, Otho, Webster County, Iowa
- Walter Roland Goodrich born December 5, 1892 in Lehigh, Webster County, Iowa; died February 19, 1977 in Colfax, Whitman County, Washington. Married Dora Rosella on February 18, 1915 in Whitman County, Washington. She was born November 25, 1894 in Washington and died June 3, 1973 in Colfax, Whitman County, Washington.

Thus, we have another spelling of Roland, as Rolla, in the census records. So you can see how the name Roland, both first and middle, had many spelling variations in this Goodrich family. Ida Mae Goodrich married Orville Roland Julian to bring the name of Roland in as an in-law. Per the Social Security Death Index and Washington Death Index, Walter Clark Goodrich died February 19, 1977 in Colfax, Whitman County, Washington. Walter Clark and Margaret Goodrich are both buried in Colfax Cemetery, Colfax, Whitman County, Washington. As most genealogists have discovered in their research, the spelling of names varies from record to record. It is best to keep additional information to match the person in the records that are found. This was the case with Roland as the name moved from Ohio to Iowa and Minnesota and to California and Washington following the westward movement of many Goodriches and other pioneers.



Callahill M. Goodrich Revisited – Every Word is a Clue

We had a request in the March Quarterly for more information about the Callahill M. Goodrich family. He was son of Daniel Goodrich who married 24 Oct. 1827¹ Jane Dameron. Daniel Goodrich was a planter and slave owner in Bedford County, Virginia³ until he moved to Ohio and later, in 1845² to Indiana where he died.² Our thanks go to reader Lynne Alber who cued us in where to find additional information about this family – and to check out a new resource we hadn't used, Quaker genealogy, which allowed us to trace this family further. The fact Virginia did not require birth/death registration until 1853 complicated the search. But the big clue was the fact there seemed to be no records available. This was because the Quakers kept their own private meeting records, and had nothing to do with civil records. Additionally, if a Quaker left the faith, they were in the habit to change their names so they would not bring shame on their parents. Daniel Goodrich became Daniel Goodrick after the family left Virginia and the Quaker faith. Before the Civil War, Quakers had an issue with their members owning slaves; because of this, some Quakers moved and/or left the Quaker faith and then began to be listed in civil records.

Missing information found in Quaker meeting records:

Phebe Goodrich, m. bond 1827, 10th month, 24,³ m. 15 Feb. 1813,¹ Amherst Co. VA,¹ John Damron, whose name would later change to Dameron. John's first wife had died. Phebe listed on her marriage bond that she was the mother of Jane, Daniel's wife below, and Jane's sister Elizabeth Dameron. Phebe was dau of Edmund B. Goodrich, b. 1750, and Frances Pearce, b. 1762, who married 1782 in Virginia.⁵

Daniel Goodrich b. VA (name changed to Goodrick after he left the Quakers)
m. Jane Dameron 1827 10th month 24,³ Quaker date (24 Dec 1827)
dau. Mary Elizabeth Goodrich Harrison Palmer

eldest son and second child of Charles L. Hodson, ² contractor and
manufacturer of South Bend, IN ² from the earliest years of the town's
development as an important commercial center.

Daniel Goodrich and wife were plaintiffs in a 26 Sep 1836 chancery suit where Gipson Damron, infant, was defendant; the suit was dismissed in January 1870 under the 7 year rule. Such suits commonly had to do with divisions of estates or guardianship of minor children.

**“Mother Goodrich, Known as Ministering Angel Passes Away at Deadwood,”
Sunday, July 28, 1907**

This was the sub-title of the article in the Aberdeen American Newspaper; Aberdeen, South Dakota – page 7. The article’s title was “Noted Colored Woman Dead”. This sounds interesting and intriguing enough, but it was just the hook to get me involved in a full-blown research project.

“Mother Goodrich,” Celia (Blackwood) Goodrich, was born April 1846 in Kentucky and died Wednesday, July 24, 1907 in Deadwood, South Dakota. Celia was born free to a slave who had been emancipated at purchase by the Captain Blackwood family who were aristocrats from the

Blue Grass region of Kentucky. As a free black, Celia learned to read and write. This was most unusual because in many states at that time, it was illegal to teach blacks to read or write.

In 1863, Celia Blackwood met and married Thomas Goodrich of the District of Columbia. Thomas was also a free black and born circa 1834. As a young married couple they lived in Missouri and had 3 of their 11 children in Colorado – Charles, William and Thomas, Jr. In the 1870 Census, Celia and family lived in the Laramie Territory, Cheyenne, Wyoming, before they moved to Deadwood, South Dakota in 1876. Other known living children include, Ed, Fred, Harry, Catherine ‘Katie’ A. and Laura (Goodrich) Kercheval.

1876 Deadwood South Dakota - The family moved to Deadwood the same year that it was incorporated. Deadwood, so named because of the vast amount of dead and down timber in the gulch, was located in the Black Hills region of western South Dakota. 1876 was the same year that Wild ‘Bill’ Hickok was killed at the Saloon No. 10 in Deadwood and buried in the old Deadwood cemetery. His body was later moved to Mount Moriah Cemetery.

This is also the year that gold was discovered and the Deadwood gulch was staked off in forty placer-mining claims. Two of the larger mining companies were Broken Boot Gold Mine and the New Reliance Gold Mining Company. We do not know yet if this was the attraction that brought Celia and Thomas Goodrich to this area. Based on the 1870 Census documents the family was living in a rented property in the Laramie Territory; Thomas was a cook and Celia was a housekeeper.

During the same time frame, the lines of transportation were being established from Laramie, Wyoming to South Dakota. The mode of transportation was stage coach and bull trains [bull trains – a train of ox-drawn wagons that was used especially for hauling in the western United States before the establishment of the railroads]. If Celia and Thomas had no ties to the Laramie community, this would have been an opportunity for the family to migrate to a new and developing community. Even though Deadwood was isolated, rugged, and the threat of the Indian wars, the population grew rapidly during the first few years after the family’s move.

There were two monumental disasters that destroyed the town during those early days. The first was a fire in 1879 with property damage to the extent of a million and a half dollars. The second disaster occurred in 1883 when an abnormal snow and rain storm sent the mountain and streams down the gulches in torrents. The townspeople re-built both times upon the original site, with the main street running down the gulch. Even with that type of destruction, the Goodrich family remained in Deadwood.

In several newspaper/journal accounts, Thomas and Celia became involved in the lifestyle of the Deadwood citizenry. In one article of the Black Hills Daily Times, January 20, 1883. Page3, column 2, Thomas was noted as the “First Gentleman of Colored Race to Serve as Juror.” While Celia may have been known as Mother Goodrich, the Ministering Angel to the miners, she was also raising her children and was a dedicated, devoted and passionate participant in her church.

Based on the information derived from the newspaper and census documents, during the mining years she served as a nurse and doctor to the miners at their location. The method of transportation around Deadwood and into the hilly mining camps would have been horseback, horse drawn carriage or walking. Depending on the distance to the camp, sometimes it may have

been a few hours or several days of hard mountainous travel. She would probably have one or more of her sons along for the trip. She was known to have attended to patients for births, deaths and various illnesses. After nursing the sick and wounded, she would then travel back to her home in Deadwood.

Thomas' death on July 19, 1892, age 56, must have been an added hardship on the family. So Celia would have probably continued with her profession during the next few years. As documented in the tax records of 1893 and the 1900 Census, the family owned their home at 294 Williams Street free and clear of a mortgage.

In her later years, she became ill and helped to raise one of her grandchildren. Her son, Thomas Jr. lived with her, as he was a widower and had a young daughter.

Thomas Goodrich, Sr. is buried in the famed Mount Moriah Cemetery and according to the cemetery record book there is a child buried in the same lot that he is buried. His grave site is unmarked.

Celia Blackwood Goodrich died July 24, 1907, age 61, at Saint Joseph Hospital in Deadwood, South Dakota. In working with the Archivist for the City of Deadwood, the grave site for Celia is not yet located but we do believe that she is also buried at Mount Moriah. We are both working to have Celia and Thomas Goodrich added to the history of Deadwood as some of their Notable people and to gain a grant to acquire a marker for Thomas' grave.
