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## **A Warm Welcome to Our Newest Trustee, Annie Mabry**

At the conclusion of thirty-three and one-half years of a career in Colorado state and county government, Annie Mabry retired in 2006. Her natural aptitudes in organizational and corporate management ultimately led her to become a Project Management Specialist during her career. This background and experience became a natural conduit for her interest in family research. The research began in earnest in 1989. She has been a member of the Black Genealogy Search Group of Denver since 1992. Her research (primarily in Virginia) is centered on both enslaved and free-born African American ancestors. Of her eight great-grandparent branches, there is documented evidence that two branches were free. Potentially, there are two additional branches which were also free; this has not yet been validated.

Annie's legal and scholarly research exposed property deeds, ultimately discovering an ancestor being placed on the auction block (and sold), when a landowner lost his 'property' in the settlement of a gambling debt. Documentation and legal records have shown familial ancestry in the 1795 Tax Lists and the 1820 Census. This ever-evolving search has brought Annie's family closer together through the discovery of numerous cousins and the introduction of many additional relatives in her life.

With the evolution of DNA testing accuracy in genealogy, Annie has overseen the completion of DNA testing for five of the eight great-grandparent branches. Finding that three of the five branches originated from West Africa, Annie's interest in studying the continent became more intense, traveling to Ghana, West Africa from July-August 2007.

Regarding the Goodrich branch of the family, documentation exists that traces the family in Virginia through 11 generations.

The big news is we have this week uploaded an updated yDNA chart, viewed by clicking on the yDNA Results tab at the top of our Project page. Six Project members among those in the main Ensign William Goodrich group have extended their lineage tests to the most distinctive y-111 tests. Note that we show six different Goodrich branches, identified by different haplos in the haplo column, of which the Ensign William Goodrich group is the largest by far.

FTDNA has made some changes to the personal pages test participants receive. One that I feel is quite important is that a person can now designate a beneficiary, allowing your heirs to access your DNA information. Such is not a "right" of survivors when a person passes; if you want your heirs to have access to your DNA information you need to name your beneficiary.

I like the new box setup seen when you scroll down your personal page; it is so easy now to just click on a single item listed in the box, and there you go - no trouble finding things any more. And they have increased the listings of distant ancestors, it is fun to check them out and see where in the world your ancestors have traveled.

Another change that is coming, but has not yet happened, is that FTDNA plans by the end of the year to overwrite paternal and maternal Gedcom files and replace them with a combined Gedcom. I know a number of folks have not put Gedcoms on their pages, which is fine also. I know I don't have any on my two, and still we hear from other DNA folks.



### **Goodrichtown: Still Hill, Part 3**

*This is the third article in a series about Goodrichtown and Glastonbury's forgotten neighborhoods.*

During the 18th century and the middle of the 19th century the majority of homeowners in the Goodrichtown section of Nayaug were descendants of Ephraim Goodrich (#16) and his wife Sarah Treat. The neighborhood, which was originally part of Treat Farm, was located about a quarter mile south of Roaring Brook on Main Street in South Glastonbur, CT. At the top of what is known as "Still Hill" the northern boundary of the old cemetery marks one border of the approximately 840 acres owned by the Goodrich family. On Main Street, the property continued down what was once called the "Country Road" past Foote Road and ended near Great Pond Road.

Although his surname was Goodrich, the man who built the house at 634 Main Street can't be found in the Goodrich family genealogy. His ancestry is unknown and he does not appear to be a direct descendant of Ephraim and Sarah. Francis Goodrich, or Frank as he was known, purchased two acres adjacent to the southern border of Still Hill Cemetery from Edward Goodrich (#423) in 1853 for \$200. Edward, the great grandson of Ephraim and Sarah, owned the neighboring house south of that property, at the corner of Foote Road.

The two-acre lot was located on a small rise of land known to the local residents as “Pound Hill.” Apparently in earlier days a public animal pound was located in the vicinity. That name has not remained as well-known as “Still Hill,” the steeper hill to the north, which acquired its name from the cider brandy distillery located on the east side of the hill.

Frank was a joiner and probably worked for Edward Edwards, a prominent local builder. Edwards built St. Luke’s Church in 1837. It is unlikely that Frank was involved with that project, but it is probable that he did build his own house. He was 28 years old when he married 26 year old Elizabeth Harding in 1850. Their home at 634 Main Street was built three years later.

The house is an example of Greek Revival, a popular architectural style of the time period. The two-panel front door has narrow flanking sidelights and a transom above. Most features, including the front façade with its pedimented gable and pilasters that define the corners are well preserved. The south wing with its secondary entrance has similar details. Attached to the northeast rear corner is a large two-story gable roofed wing with a four bay façade and wide porch, which are not original to the house. Most of the windows are 6 over 6 double hung and appear to be old.

Francis died in 1869, leaving a wife and young daughter, Ella. Ella, “a minor,” inherited the house, and her mother, in the capacity of her guardian, immediately sold it to Edward Edwards for \$1300.

In 1876 Edwards sold the house to Elizabeth Jones, the widow of Eleazar Jones. When she died ten years later, Sanford Sheffield, the administrator of her estate, sold it to Philo Phelps, John Moseley and John Tryon. These three men sold the house to the Town of Glastonbury for \$800. The town established a poorhouse, which became known for more than a century as “Town Farm.”

The first residents were women. Each Sunday at 3 p.m. the South Glastonbury Congregational Church held services for the women. There was an organ in the parlor and hymn singing was a popular feature. In later years the Town Farm became a home for men. In 1942, an appeal was made to the town to rent rooms to war workers. Four men became temporary-paying guests. Although most of the residents were homeless elderly men with limited income, there often were other “guests.” A former housekeeper said that it was not unusual to get a late night phone call from “a young mother or kid in a hot spot.” There was always room for someone who had his utilities shut off. To the “regulars” this was home and their fellow residents were their family. The boarding house was running at a deficit in the 1980s. The town considered closing the facility at that time, but public opposition caused it to remain open until 1997. By then, significant repairs were needed. The Town relocated the few remaining occupants and the property was put on the market. Today the old Goodrich house on “Pound Hill” is once again a private home.

During past reunions, we began reporting and updating on the DNA testing for our blended families. This year, the updates were on the Goodrich, Jones, and Coleman families. The Goodrich families of Lawrenceville, Virginia were a major part of the “G2” Reunion. At this reunion, the Oversight Committee established the foundation and organization for future reunions. We cited our purpose, the family pledge, and how we will acknowledge and recognize our family – awards, honors, and memorials for future reunions.

In addition, we announced the creation of the “G2” Generation To Generation logo and website; posted family tree charts of the descendants of our patriarch,



Jackson Goodrich, (born circa 1822), and his wife, Martha (maiden name unknown). The charts were over 150 feet-long and covered eleven generations, encompassing research that has been gathered and validated over a twenty-three year time-span. Several years ago, our research on Jackson and Martha Goodrich hit the proverbial “brick-wall” of research; ultimately we decided to enhance our research by adding the DNA process.

DNA Update! – Jackson’s great-great grandson, took the DNA test and became a member of the Goodrich Family Association. The results of both tests connect Jackson Goodrich’s family lineage to Thomas Goodrich of Virginia by way of his descendant, Fed Goodrich.

## **The Civil War Diaries of Ralph Leland Goodrich**

In the midst of the Civil War, in the dirty and dispirited capital of confederate Arkansas, a slender school teacher of young boys rose early on the morning of May 15, 1863 to prepare his classroom for the daily lessons. Most of the boys' fathers and older brothers were serving in the Confederate army far away from home. The young boys left behind were an unruly and disrespectful band of rowdies -- especially toward their teacher whom they all knew to be a "Yankee" from New York State. On this day, 15 year-old Juba Rector decided to challenge the authority of his teacher and was quickly called to task, whipped, and turned out -- a stream of invectives hurled at the teacher by the boy as he fled the classroom.

Before long the boy's father, Arkansas Governor Henry M. Rector, showed up and asked to speak with the teacher behind the school. When the teacher got to the part about hitting young Juba, the Governor struck the teacher on the side of his head with his clenched fist and bellowed, "Just as I strike you, you God damned son of a bitch, you damned stinking Yankee, you Yankee dog. You strike my son like I would a Negro, you God damned miserable Yankee dog."

Such are the words that 26 year-old school teacher Ralph Leland Goodrich (#LWC2145) wrote in his diary describing the memorable day's events. Ralph had come to Little Rock in October 1860, before the outbreak of hostilities between the North and South. Previously he had taught the children of plantation owners south of Tallahassee, Florida, and in a boy's school in Camden, South Carolina. Though brief and unprofitable, these employment opportunities had exposed the college-educated young teacher to a world that was much different than the one in which he was raised. Yet he liked the southern lifestyle and yearned for a situation that would enable him to be accepted by the locals and to gain respectability. He was, in fact, so much in earnest to fit in that when Arkansas seceded from the Union in 1861 to join the other confederate states, Ralph responded with other young men in Little Rock and enlisted in Company A of the 6th Arkansas Confederate infantry.

Ralph did not find life in the confederate army the least bit enjoyable. After the war he admitted to a friend that he had spent the entire six months of his service shamelessly looking for a medical discharge so that he could return to Little Rock and resume his civilian career. But the years spent in Little Rock following his discharge from the army would be turbulent and troublesome. Life in the besieged city was hard -- especially for someone whose loyalty to the confederate cause was questioned and whose service was considered less than honorable. During the remainder of the war years and for several years afterwards, until he finally landed a clerk's job in the District Courts, Ralph was employed as a school teacher, a bartender, a prison guard, a store clerk, a theater doorman, a landlord, and a cotton speculator.

The Ralph Leland Goodrich Diaries, 1859-1867 are now published at [www.goodrichpoems.wordpress.com](http://www.goodrichpoems.wordpress.com). They are reproduced in their entirety, in unedited form, permitting the student of history to gain direct insight into what life was like for a young man witnessing the whirlwind of events leading up to and during the American Civil War in such places as South Carolina, Florida, and Arkansas. Like so many other families, this particular Goodrich family was torn apart by that conflict -- one brother serving in the Union army, the

other serving in the Confederate army. The diaries and related correspondence are housed at the Arkansas History Commission in Little Rock, Arkansas. Until posted on this website, however, they had only been partially transcribed and researched. This website was researched and created by Bill Griffing who is a descendant of Jemima Augusta Goodrich (#LWC2141) – the older sister of Ralph Leland Goodrich.

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## Goodrich Family Centenarian

Mrs. Prudence Goodrich died at Middletown on the 11<sup>th</sup>, aged 100 years. She was formerly the widow of Capt. Joseph Savage. The number of her descendants is 190, as of Sept. 26, 1807.

## About Archibald Goodrich and Mabel Beebe

From verbal accounts I know that I am descended from Samuel Goodrich and Lurana Trowbridge through their granddaughter, Electa Parmelia Goodrich, who was born 05 May 1832 near Tully, New York. Her death record of 02 Oct 1916, Williams County, Ohio, affirms her parents, her birth date and birth place. She moved to southern Michigan, worked as a school teacher, and stayed with her sister, Sarah Campen. Her eldest son, Robert Archibald Lougheed, born 1854 “at a railroad camp near Bryan, Ohio,” is my great-great grandfather.

In July of 2010, I visited the Suggett House Museum – Kellogg Memorial Library in Cortland, NY. They have a much-used 1908 book “The Trowbridge Genealogy,” that was a gift of the Fannie M. Galusha Estate - 1945.

Hand written notes on pages 137 and 842 through 846 list the descendants of Lurana Trowbridge, who is given as a daughter of James Trowbridge, No. 158 of the hard-bound publication. I was told that these notes were written by Sarah Wilbur:

Hand written under Lurana it says: “born Apr, 1758 – died Jan. 31, 1835”

Hand written in the right margin is:

“Samuel Goodrich 1750 – 1835 was a sea-faring man. He served 7 years in the Revolutionary War. He enlisted first with New York Troops. Records at the Adjutant General’s Office at Washington show that he served as carpenter in Capt. Barlow’s Company, Graham’s Reg. N.Y. Troops.

His name appears on a return of this Regiment: dated at Peekskill, Nov, 14, 1776. Bureau of Pensions at Washington, D.C. have the record that he enlisted Jan 1, 1777 in Massachusetts and was discharged at West Point, N.Y. Jan. 1, 1780. His Captain was Jenkins and Col. Samuel Brewer

He rec’d a Pension of \$96 per annum.

Samuel and Lurana died in Tully N.Y. and were buried in one grave at Preble Center.

Hand written next to Samuel Goodrich is: "b. May 7, 1750 d. Feb 1, 1835"

Hand writing on the bottom margin says:

Hand written in bottom right corner is: "See Family Register in back of book for records of descendants."

Each family is expounded upon beginning on page 842 except for Betsy, Lurana, and Aaron; of whom it was noted "nothing more known." These other notes which I have also scanned and transcribed contain data up to January 1915.

This is the same list that appears on the D. A. R. application.

The Revolutionary Pension application only records one daughter, Permelia, before she was married.

I was directed to this museum and this volume via email by a descendant of Lurana Goodrich-Bartlett, Gail Pike.

The appendix also provides an extensive list of Galusha descendants. The Saggett House has some additional information in a Galusha folder. Note that this source does not list a daughter named Charlotte (Charlotte who married Timothy Smith is given in the notes as the 8<sup>th</sup> child of Samuel Jr. and Martha Frink) nor does it list a daughter named Mary, although perhaps Mary is the same person as Polly.

The obituary of Sarah Galusha, who died 26 June 1885, says "Of the ten children comprising her father's family, but one, Mrs. Dea. Waters, of McGrawville survive her..."

The Comstock genealogy (Pitman, H. Minot, Comstock-Thomas Ancestry of Richard Wilmot Comstock, 1964) lists:

- 8-Samuel, b. abt. 1777, Sheffield, Berkshire Co., Mass., d. Fabius, Onondaga Co., N. Y., 6 Jan. 1866.

In the Comstock genealogy, Pittman gives quite a lot of data and references about this Samuel Goodrich, born May 1750 and Jared, born July 1714 and says "This Samuel Goodrich must not

be confused with the three or four others of the name in Berkshire Co. at the same time..." referring to those of Berlin, Lenox, Egremont and Delaware.

He gives Jared's children as: Sarah Winslow, 7-Samuel, Joseph, Paul, and Abigail; mother of at least four of them as Miriam Stockwell; and his marriage to her in the year 1739 not 1759.

Pitman acknowledges the sources which list the children (and wives) of this Jared Goodrich differently and makes his case by referencing several Sheffield Town Records & indexes, Pittsfield Deeds & Wills. Since there is "considerable disagreement and confusion" as he says, I am very interested hearing someone else's opinion of this work. Pitman obviously did not use the data from Cortland or the D. A. R. with regards to Samuel's children.

The handwritten account of the children born to Archibald Goodrich and Mabel Beebe is corroborated by a biography of Broome County, New York published 1894, pages 786 and 787. It says in part, "Chauncey W. Goodrich, the oldest settler now living in the town of Sanford, Broome County, was born in Pompey, Onondaga County, N.Y., February 26, 1821.

"His grandfather, a scion of one of the old Puritan families of New England, removed to Onondaga County, and settled near Pompey Hill, buying land from Onondaga Indians at his own price. He and his wife died when nearly eighty years of age, and were buried in the same grave. They were devoted and excellent members of the Presbyterian Church. Of their eight children, none are living.

"Archibald Goodrich, father of Chauncey, was born in Onondaga County and grew to manhood in the town of Pompey. He followed the trade of blacksmith and in his last years moved to Michigan, settling in Lenawee County, where he remained until his death at the age of seventy-eight years. His wife, Mabel Beebe, who was also a native of Onondaga County, was about seventy-eight years of age when she died in Michigan. They were members of the Methodist church, and Archibald was a Republican in politics. Six of their nine children are now living, namely, Mary, (Mrs. Galusha), of Cortland County; Electa, of Ohio; Archibald of Steuben County, New York; Louis of Onondaga County; John, a County Judge in Ottawa, Michigan County; and Chauncey W. The three who died were Mary, at five years, Sarah, at twenty-five, and Harvey, at thirty."

Archibald Goodrich was born 2 Nov 1792, died 14 Mar 1865; his birthplace may have been New City, NY.

I have visited his burial marker at the locust Corners Cemetery near Pittsford, Michigan. The site was originally that of a Free-Will Baptist Church where Mabel Goodrich was the first of four generations who were members; the log books are housed at Hillsdale, Michigan in the Mitchell Museum/Library. Mabel's death occurred in Williams County, Ohio less than a week before her 84<sup>th</sup> birthday on 10 July 1882. The Death Record does not name her parents, but says that her occupation was "Weaver," and born in New York.
