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The Family of Jehiel⁵ Goodrich of Middlebury, Vermont to Stockton, New York ~ By Steve Goodrich, Ph.D.




Figure 1: Family of LWC 139 Jehiel⁴ Goodrich and Prudence Miller of Glastonbury, Hartford, Connecticut.²

LWC 418 Jehiel⁵ Goodrich, son of LWC 139 Jehiel⁴ Goodrich (*William*³, *Ephraim*², *William*¹),¹ was born in Glastonbury, Hartford, Connecticut on 19 Jul 1772.² Jehiel⁴ Goodrich had married Prudence Miller, daughter of Mr. John Miller, on 22 Mar 1764 and settled in South Glastonbury, where they had 3 daughters and 7 sons from 1765-1784 (Figure 1).²




Figure 2: Treat Farm adjacent to the Four-Score Lots: 1) as of 1688 310 rods in width on both river side and east side; total 1,860 acres (left), and 2) after deeds from Richard Treat to son-in-law Ephraim Goodrich in 1688-1692 (480 acres) and to son Thomas Treat in 1693 (1,380 acres; right).

As of the date of his marriage in 1764, Jehiel⁴ Goodrich resided in South Glastonbury on land deeded to him in 1758 by his father, William³ Goodrich. The maps in Figures 2-4 review the origin of the lands of his grandfather, Ephraim² Goodrich, in South Glastonbury and show the proximity of lands of Treat heirs, Jehiel⁴ Goodrich and Capt. Stephen⁴ Goodrich in Figure 4.




Figure 3: Approximate disposition of the Treat Farm evident from the will of Thomas³ Treat dated 13 Jun 1709 (and witnessed that day by Richard³ Goodrich, Thomas³ Goodrich and Daniel Andrews; left), and in particular the approximate later distribution of the lands, in accordance with the will, dated 17 Jul 1735 which states that the uplands of Isaac⁴ Treat are bounded south by land of Richard³ Goodrich,⁶ and also in accordance with Glastonbury and Wethersfield (for Ephraim³ Goodrich) land records involving sons of Ephraim² Goodrich in the map (right).^{7,8}




Figure 4: Approximate disposition of lands of Ephraim² Goodrich in *Goodrich Town* in South Glastonbury,⁹ according to Glastonbury land records involving sons (left)¹⁰ and grandsons (right) of Ephraim² Goodrich. In the map on the right, green tracts numbered 1 to 4 in the upper-right corner were acquired by Capt. Stephen⁴ Goodrich: 1) 100 acres deeded by William³ Goodrich in 1754,^{11, 12} 2) 50 acre homestead of which 44 acres were purchased from Richard Fox in 1759,¹³ selling the west 60 acres of the 100 acres to Richard Fox the same day¹⁴ and selling the east 40 acres to Thomas⁴ Goodrich in 1760,¹⁵ 3) 60 acres purchased from William³ Goodrich in 1760,¹⁶ which are closest to 88 acres William³ Goodrich deeded to Jehiel⁴ Goodrich in 1758,¹⁷ 4) two 14-acre Four-Score lot tracts.¹⁸

Though Jehiel⁴ and Prudence (Miller) Goodrich remained on their farm in South Glastonbury (Figure 4), their son Jehiel⁵ Goodrich moved to Middlebury, Addison, Vermont and with his wife Mary had three daughters baptized at Middlebury Church of Christ, as recorded in three separate entries dated 23 Aug 1807 in the church records (Figure 5):¹⁹

- Thura Goodrich, daughter of Jehiel and Mary Goodrich
- Nancy Goodrich, daughter of Jehiel and Mary Goodrich
- Dorothy Treat Goodrich, daughter of Jehiel and Mary Goodrich

No known records prior to 1810 reveal when or where Jehiel⁵ Goodrich married, when he arrived in Middlebury, or the maiden name of his wife Mary. However, additional family information can be found in tombstone inscriptions in the Washington Street Cemetery in Middlebury:

- Prudence Miller, dau of Jehiel & Mary Goodrich, d 7/24/1802, aged 11 mos and 15 days
- Dorothy T., dau of Jehiel & Mary Goodrich b. 2/07/1807 d. 11/03/1807
- Mary Goodrich, dau of Jehiel & Mary Goodrich, b 9/05/1808, d 2/13/1809
- Jehiel Goodrich d 1 Feb 1813, age 41
- _____ Goodrich dau of Jehiel and Mary Goodrich, died 6/09/1821, aged 20 yrs
- (Broken foundation stone with small portion of original inscription) d. 1821

The family information contained in the baptismal records and the tombstone inscriptions, which is all that has been found so far, reveal the following daughters, in postulated birth order:

- **Thura**⁶ **Goodrich** (~1801-1821), who shared her first name with paternal second cousin Thurii⁶ Goodrich (1783-1803);²⁰ the only child of William⁵ and Mary (Hollister) Goodrich.
- **Prudence**⁶ **Miller Goodrich** (1801-1802), b. 09 Aug 1801, who died in infancy and whose certain namesake was her paternal grandmother Prudence (Miller) Goodrich.
- Nancy⁶ Goodrich (died in 1821), by process of elimination a daughter born ~1802-1805 who survived past baptism and whose tombstone is broken, revealing only year of death.
- **Dorothy**⁶ **Treat Goodrich** (1807-1807), who also died in infancy and whose likely namesake, by analogy with her older sister Prudence Miller Goodrich, was her grand-aunt in Middlebury: Dorothy (Treat) Goodrich, the first wife of Capt. Stephen⁴ Goodrich. Grand-aunt Dorothy will be discussed further in the next article in this issue.
- Mary Goodrich (1808-1809), named after her mother, who died in infancy.

Jehiel and Mary have no household members under age 10 in the 1800 US Census for Middlebury, ²¹ and given the five daughters mentioned, Jehiel and Mary should have had two females under age 10 in the 1810 US Census for Middlebury, and this is found to be the case. However, in the 1810 US Census there is a male in their household under age 10 who is not accounted for in the baptismal records or in the tombstone inscriptions. ²² The identity of the son of Jehiel⁵ and Mary Goodrich in the 1810 US Census, as well as another son born after 1810, are revealed through: 1) tombstone photos from Evergreen Cemetery in Stockton, NY posted on Find-a-Grave (Figure 6), 2) an 1837 land deed in Stockton revealing the maiden name of the widow Mary Goodrich that is also revealed on her tombstone, 3) US and NY Census records (1840-1880), and 4) Stockton-Delanti church records.




Figure 8: among the members on these two pages of the records of the Stockton Presbyterian parish,³³ which was formed on 31 Oct 1819, are Mary Goodrich (admitted 10 Mar 1826; Figure 11), Henry Goodrich and wife Lovina, and Henry Look. Henry Goodrich and Henry Look were both ordained as ruling elders on 20 Feb 1831 (Figure 13). In the parish records Lovina Goodrich died on 09 Jun 1830 (a burial roster in the Cassadaga Cemetery indicates that she died on 13 Jun 1831 at age 24 and her husband Henry Goodrich died 16 Aug 1832 at age 36).³⁴ Jehial Goodrich was admitted to the parish on 10 Nov 1832.³⁵ Also shown are Zephaniah Rogers and wife Polly, who are found in the 1800 US Census³⁶ and in 1802-1803 tax assessment rolls³⁷ for Hebron, Washington, NY and purchased land in Stockton in Sep 1822 (Figure 10). Phebe Rogers, wife of Chauncey⁶ Goodrich, stated in the 1855 NY State Census for Stockton that she was born in Washington County, New York and had been a resident of Stockton for 33 years, or since 1822, so pending a proof record Zephaniah Rogers could be her father.

Mary Look may share a tombstone with Aaron⁵ Goodrich (LWC 393), a son of Capt. Stephen⁴ Goodrich. An 1837 Stockton land deed also names her Mary Look (Figure 7), while 1826-1831 Stockton church records name her (Mrs.) Mary Goodrich (Figures 8-9). Her parish death entry dated Oct 1843 is not annotated with any details.

In the 1850 US Census for Stockton, Chautauqua, NY household head Lucius Goodrich and wife Mary Ann have four daughters: Eliza age 15, Rosina age 11, and twins Mary and Martha age 6. Brother Jehial Goodrich, a bachelor who throughout his life spelled his first name differently than his father and paternal grandfather spelled Jehiel, is also in the household; in the 1860 US Census he is revealed to be a farm laborer.²³ Whenever their place of birth was requested in a census record, including the 1880 US Census for Stockton in which they stated their parents were born in Connecticut, brothers Lucius and Jehial always stated they were born in Vermont.²⁴

Families of LWC 395 Martha⁵ Goodrich, LWC 1055 Chauncey⁶ Goodrich and Others

Possible namesakes for the twin daughters of Lucius⁶ and Mary Ann Goodrich born about 1844: Mary⁷ Goodrich and Martha⁷ Goodrich, are their paternal grandmother Mary Goodrich/Look and LWC 395 Martha⁵ (Goodrich) Crane, daughter of Capt. Stephen⁴ and Dorothy Goodrich.²⁵ Martha⁵ Goodrich married Jeremiah Crane on 18 Sep 1788 and had 8 sons and 1 daughter with him in Middlebury²⁶ before Jeremiah died in 1814.²⁷ Five of their children: Stephen, Aaron, Ammon, William and Thurii (Crane) Johnson, deceased in 1824-1882, have tombstones in Stockton Evergreen Cemetery stating their parents are Jeremiah and Martha (Goodrich) Crane.²⁸ The burial of Martha (which may also be in Stockton, possibly in 1836,²⁹ since more than half of her children were living there) and her residence in the 1830 US Census have not been found. Additional relations in Stockton at the time included nephew Chauncey⁶ Goodrich (LWC 1055), a rural resident of Stockton since 1825, whose 1893 obituary (Figure 12) stated that Chauncey married Phebe Rogers in 1827 and with her had three sons and three daughters.³⁰

Figure 9: the Stockton Presbyterian parish continued until 1858, and in Jul 1858 Jehial⁶ Goodrich became a member of the Delanti, NY Methodist Episcopalian parish, as shown in the list above.³⁸ Though Lucius⁶ Goodrich never appeared in the records of the Stockton Presbyterian parish, the list shown above indicates that he joined the Delanti Methodist Episcopalian parish in 1859, was a class leader, and that his wife was later admitted to the parish on 01 Jun 1861. The death of Elsa⁷ Goodrich on 26 Feb 1885 on her tombstone (Figure 6) is verified in the records. The 17 May 1871 marriage of Alice⁷ M. Goodrich, daughter of Chauncey⁶ Goodrich, to Levi Flynt is also recorded.



Douth of Chauncey Goodrich.

We are pained to hear of the death of this excellent and venerable citizen of Stockton, who died on the 3d inst. He has been a subscriber of the Casson from very soon after its first issue in 1821, and the present publishers have enjoyed many annual visits from him when he came in to renew. The following obstuary, prepared by his pastor. Rev. Mr. Hankinson, will be read with interest:

The uncertainty of human life has received another illustration in the sudden calling away of our well known officen. Channesy Goodrich, who was born in Middlebury county, state of Vermont, on Dec. 14, 1803. In the year 1823 he came to the state of New York, Chantangian county to make it his permanent home. Shortly after his arrival he was ordered by authority of the town to leave, as the law of the town then provided that any person who was likely to become a charge ou account of charity should be ordered to leave in order to relieve the town from the liability. Shortly afterward he included a farm two piles west of the

present village of Stockton. In the year 1827 he united in marriage to Phoebe Rodgers, who depirted this life in the month of October, 1880. While moving his household goods from the village of Stockton to the farm he was obliged to fall sixteen trees to reach the farm. A family of six children was three girls. The eldest loy is dead.
One girl is now Mrs. H. Q. Ames, of
Sherman, another living in Erfe,
Pa. is Mrs. Flynt. One boy and one
girl, Joth married, are in Chatfield,
Minnesota, and Corydon, the youngest son, resides on the honfestend. He possessed an clustic constitution, never ill enough through tife to reed the aid of a physician. Ho felled and cleared about 125 acres of solid forest, lottle latter years of his dife he turned his attention to business speculations and proved a success. He has the record of never suing any person nor having been sued. He was strictly prompt and honest in all his dealings with his fellow men. On the morning of Jan. 45, 1893, he passed away. "He came to the grave in a full age, like as a shock of corn cometh in season." Services were conducted by Pastor J. C. Hankinson of the lirst Baptist church, Stockton.




Figure 13: Henry Look and Henry Goodrich were ordained as ruling elders of Stockton Presbyterian 20 Feb 1831. The identity of Henry Goodrich (died age 36 in 1832)³⁴ and any connection of Henry and Mary Lock are unknown.

The Maiden Name of Dorothy, the First Wife of Capt. Stephen⁴ Goodrich (LWC 136) ~ By Steve Goodrich, Ph.D.

Dorothy, the first wife of Capt. Stephen⁴ Goodrich (1732-1823), is published in the town records of Glastonbury, Connecticut for the birth of eldest child William⁵ Goodrich on 25 Aug 1755.⁴⁰ The parish records of Glastonbury First Congregational, which would normally be consulted for a record of her marriage, do not begin until 1797 and transcript records do not begin until the pastorate of Rev. John Eells in 1759, or 5 years after the published marriage date 01 Jan 1754.¹




Figure 5: Middlebury, Vermont Land Records, (7:189)

Circumstantial evidence suggests she was the namesake of grand-niece Dorothy⁶ Treat Goodrich (1807-1807), daughter of nephew Jehiel⁵ and Mary (Look) Goodrich, baptized with sisters Thura and Nancy on 23 Aug 1807 at Middlebury, VT Church of Christ (Figure 5 on p 48 of this issue).

Dorothy⁵ Treat, daughter of Thomas⁴ and Mary (Hopson) Treat, was born on 18 Jun 1731 in Glastonbury, CT. Her birth record in the *Glastonbury Town Records* (Figure 1) is consistent with Mrs. Dorothy Goodrich, whose tombstone in Middlebury reveals she died 19 Jan 1811 in the 80th year of her age (Figure 2). This Dorothy⁵ Treat was a neighbor of Stephen⁴ Goodrich in childhood (Figure 4 on p 46 of this issue) and was a 1st-cousin of another Dorothy⁵ Treat also born in 1731, a daughter of Charles⁴ Treat who married Stephen's 1st-cousin Samuel⁴ Goodrich.⁴¹ They all lived within a square mile in South Glastonbury (Figure 4 on p 46 of this issue).

When Thomas⁴ Treat, the father of the suspected namesake of Dorothy⁶ Treat Goodrich, deeded two properties to his son Gershom⁵ Treat on 01 Jan 1780 (Figure 3), the first property was defined in the legal custom of the time; that is, it named only the owners of bordering land. Yet the second property included an added redundant descriptor: "near Stephen Goodrich," though the land did not border land of Stephen Goodrich, and then the deed named owners of bordering land in the usual way. Thomas⁴ Treat likely nearly revealed one of his son-in-laws in this deed.

If Dorothy was the namesake of Dorothy⁶ Treat Goodrich, a close relationship with the parents would be suggested. This was known to be the case when Jehiel⁵ and Mary Goodrich named an older daughter Prudence⁶ Miller Goodrich after grandmother Prudence (Miller) Goodrich, wife of Jehiel⁴ Goodrich and mother of Jehiel⁵ Goodrich (p 47 of this issue). Middlebury land deeds do reveal that Capt. Stephen⁴ Goodrich sold 12.75 acres of his original farm in Middlebury to his nephew Jehiel⁵ Goodrich for \$100 (\$7.84/acre) on 08 Mar 1799 (3:335; Figure 4) at a savings relative to the 90 acres of this farm that he sold from 24-25 Dec 1799 to three individuals: 9 acres to Gamaliel Painter for \$892.32 (\$99.15/acre; 3:312), 50 acres to Dr. William Bass, M.D. for \$1,666.66 (\$33.33/acre; 3:327), and 31 acres to Daniel Chipman for \$900.00 (\$29.03/acre; 3:314). Stephen⁴ Goodrich sold his 205 acre farm in Salisbury, Vermont to son Amos⁵ Goodrich for a total price was \$1,000, or \$4.88 per acre (9:50), so Jehiel⁵ Goodrich was nearly treated like a son. The most convincing evidence of a close relationship is found in a quit-claim deed of Middlebury, VT dated 17 Oct 1814 (7:189; Figure 5). Those named as grantors on the quit-claim deed were Stephen⁴ Goodrich, sons Aaron⁵ Goodrich and Amos⁵ Goodrich, Jeremiah Crane and his wife Martha⁵ (Goodrich) Crane, and Mary Goodrich, widow of Jehiel⁵ Goodrich. Though the widowed Mary was not an immediate or even in-law family member, she was still named in the quit-claim deed and in the will of William⁵ Goodrich.

Thomas⁴ Treat deeded two properties, one 25 acres and one 8 acres, to his son Gershom⁵ Treat, a younger brother of Dorothy⁵ Treat of Glastonbury. The description of the 8 acre tract includes the redundant descriptor: "near Stephen Goodrich," though the tract did not border Stephen's land, and then names owners of land bordering north, south, east and west as was customary.

Y-SNP Testing of the Felsham Goodrich Group at YSEQ Completed

G18, G50 and G62 completed testing of the 28 Y-SNP markers, including Z5018 and Z16242, that were found positive in G18 (the author) and are suitable for Sanger sequencing verification. The results shown in Table 1 below reveal that at least with the 26 Y-SNP markers beyond Z5018 and Z16242, which Felsham Goodrich shares with non-Goodrich, G50 and G62 both share 22 Y-SNP markers and do not share 4 Y-SNP markers with G18, so their degree of relationship with G18 is not resolved and must await the outcome of Y-Elite 2.0 tests in progress.

Discussion of Y-SNP Testing Results

As mentioned in the June 2015 issue, failure to resolve the relationship of G18, G50 and G62 by finding that G50 shares at least one Y-SNP marker with G18 that G18 does not share with G62, does not allow for the ancestry of immigrant William Goodridge of Watertown to be proven.

More importantly, whether or not the relationships of G18, G50 and G62 can be resolved, the completion of their Y-Elite 2.0 tests will reveal most likely 6-7 unique Y-SNP markers for each of the immigrant ancestral lines.

These Y-SNP markers can then be tested, either at Y-SEQ as part of a panel or by taking a Y-Elite test, in order for those of unknown immigant ancestry to determine which immigrant line their Y-SNP markers are consistent with.
